#### FROM THE COMMITTEE OF MANAGEMENT

#### MECHANICS INSTITUTION & SCHOOL OF ARTS

#### TO THE MEMBERS.

The Committee of Management of the Melbourne Mechanics' Institution, have great pleasure in being enabled to submit to the present Annual General Meeting of Subscribers, a most satisfactory Report on the

present position and future prospects of the Institution.
In the Report made to the General Meeting at this period last year, the Subscribers were informed, that by the exertions of a few of the Members of the Committee, a sufficient sum had been collected in the shape of donations, by which the very heavy amount of debt that had previously weighed so seriously on the prosperity and usefulness of the Institution, had been reduced to the sum of £1,050, but to this sum ought to have been added the interest due thereon, which has since been paid, amounting to £80 19s. 4d.

You were also informed, gentlemen, that an arrangement had been made with the Port Phillip Savings' Bank, by which the Institution was to receive a sum of £800, on a mortage of the premises, at an Interest of 8 ? cent. P annum.

This arrangement has since been finally carried out and by a further payment of £130 19s. 4d., towards the original debt the balance now due thereon to Captain Swanston, (the late mortgagee,) is reduced to £200.

By the new laws introduced and adopted at the last General Meeting, whereby "all persons who may not have paid their Annual Subscriptions by the 31st of March in each year, shall cease to be Members;" your Committee will, at that date, be enabled to make the disbursements for the current year with certainty, and until this period they propose to defer the payment of the old debt of £200, as should their expectations with reference to the funds not be realized, they will endeavour to enter into other arrangements by which a portion of the said debt may, in its payment, be postponed until the next year; the Committee, therefore, pledge themselves to the Subscribers to expend at least the sum of £150 in the increase of the Library and support of the Reading Room.

As a few of the Members of the Institution who were not present at the last Annual General Meeting expressed some doubt of the policy and propriety of the Law, whereby "All persons who may not have paid their Subscriptions on or before the 31st of March in each year, shall cease to be Members," the Committee have great pleasure in assuring such Members that the adoption thereof has been attended with the most beneficial effects to the

Institution, not only enabling the Committee to regulate the financial affairs of the Institution with confidence and certainty, but in having excluded from the List of Members a number of persons who availed themselves of all the privileges of the Institution, without having contributed any payment whatever for a series of years to its support.

In the foregoing statement your Committee have detailed fully for your information the present financial position of the Institution, and the proposed application of the Revenue for the current year, which they cannot doubt will be satisfactory to you, and they beg to further add a brief sketch of the progress of the Institution during the last two years.

Thus within a period of two years the sum of £628 19s. 10d. has been appropriated to the payment of old debts, and the total amount due now by the Institution, is reduced to £1000.

The sum of £301 has been appropriated to the purchase of Books

for the Library and Reading Room.

The annual revenue has increased £171 6s. 3d. The number of Members has increased 106.

And every Member now on the List having paid his Subscription to the end of the year, is a bona fide Subscriber.

Your Committee having given a full statement of the financial prospects of the Institution, would now call your attention to a more detailed account of the advancement of the several branches of the Society's objects.

THE LIBRARY.

In the month of May, 1846, the Treasurer of the Institution forwarded to Messrs. Simmonds and Ward, of London, the sum of £50 for the purchaseof Works of Popular Literature suitable to the taste of the general readers belonging to the Society, and which they reasonably expected to receive in the course of the ensuing year at the farthest, but as yet, though nearly twoyears have elapsed, they have not received any account whatever of the outlay of the funds remitted, the receipt however, has been duly acknowledged. Upon this subject several very urgent letters have been sent to Messrs. Simmonds and Ward, and also to Mr. Westgarth, (the late Treasurer of the Institution,) which, it is hoped, have had the effect of causing the Books. ordered to be purchased and forwarded without delay. Notwithstanding the drawback occasioned by the above annoying circumstances, your Committee feel pleasure in stating that the Library has been increased by the addition of nearly 400 vols., by purchase and donations, and that the daily circulation of the Works belonging to it is calculated on an average to be between 250 and 300 vols., the greater part of these being constituted of those purchased by your Committee during the past year.

Your Committee would also draw your attention to the fact of the Library having contained only 400 vols. in the year 1843, whereas the

number of volumes at present exceeds 2,000!

Owing to the great inconvenience and delay arising from remitting money to England for the purchase of Books, your Committee have it in contemplation (provided more satisfactory arrangements cannot be made) to purchase Books in these Colonies, so that as far as possible the wishes of the Subscribers for New Works of interest and utility may be at once and promptly met.

THE READING ROOM.

From the number of Persons daily attending at the Reading Room of the Institution your Committee are induced to augur favorably of its usefulness in extending the information contained in the various Periodicals of the day, and that from the many advantages which it holds out to the public generally, it will become of material importance towards the advancement of the interests of the Society.

MUSEUM.

In the department of the Museum, your Committee regret that since the date of the last Report so little has been done towards its extension, the contributions not having increased in the ratio that might be expected in a country rich in very many of the productions which constitute such collections. A few objects have, however, been presented, which, with the names of the Donors will be found appended to this Report. Under the circumstances your Committee take this opportunity of earnestly impressing upon all well-wishers of the Institution and those desiring the advancement of the community in Science and the knowledge of the resources of the country, the unquestionable importance of an extensive collection of objects of Natural History, and they now call upon them to contribute, which they do the more earnestly as there is rarely to be found an individual, who with little or no trouble or expense to himself cannot assist in the accomplishment of so desirable an object.

LECTURES.

During the course of the present season there have been delivered to the Members of the Institution a series of nine Lectures on various subjects by Messrs. Forbes, Barry, Morison, Ramsay, and Haydon, to whom the thanks of this Meeting, for their eloquent and able exertions will be duly transmitted. There is every reason to hope that henceforward not only will the assistance of the Gentlemen named be again offered to the Institution, but that many others who have already kindly promised their aid to the Society, will come forward and give Lectures before the close of the present year.

CLASSES.

Your Committee would feel themselves wanting in their duty, did they not notice with marked approbation the zeal of the Honorary Secretary of the Institution, who for the last twelve months, has devoted his professional abilities towards the instruction of several Members in the art of perspective drawing and colouring, and that too, without charge to either the pupils, or the Society. To carry out the views of the above Gentleman, your Committee will at the very first opportunity, devote from the funds at their disposal, a sum for the purchase of models, copies, &c., for the use of the Members attending the drawing class.

A French class is now also in operation under the superintendence of Mr. Butterfield, a fee of half a-guinea per quarter being paid by the

Pupils.—Attendance twice a week.

The exertions of the above Gentlemen, have been attended with success, and your Committee would earnestly recommend the Members to avail themselves of the advantages thus afforded them.

Your Committee are in hopes that before the close of the present year, they will be enabled to establish Classes, having for their object, the

diffusion of adult education in its various branches.

In conclusion, your Committee deem it necessary to explain, that their reason for deferring the task of compiling a catalogue for the use of the Members, was the non-arrival of the books daily expected from their agents in London, as, had they prepared such a list, and the new works come to hand, the additional expense of a complete revision of the catalogue would have been occasioned.
