On no occasion have your Committee been able to present to the members of the Institution their Annual Report with feelings of greater satisfaction than on the

The past year has again witnessed a vast accession to the list of subscribers, and a general progress towards the attainment of the objects of the Institution.

The increase of the member-list will appear from the

With reference to the revenue of the Institution, your Committee are happy to be able to state, that the amount has increased to nearly double that of the previous year.

From this statement it will be seen that the debt due to the Savings Bank has been reduced from £400 to £300.

Amongst these items of expenditure is also the sum of $\pounds 100$ paid as a part of the purchase-money of the small block of land immediately in the rear of the present building, which the Committee found it necessary to secure for the purposes of the Institution.

By the above purchase a liability to the amount of $\pounds 550$ was incurred. Of this $\pounds 100$ has been paid, leaving a debt on this account of $\pounds 450$, which the Committee purpose meeting by certain improvements contemplated on the frontage to Collins-street, which will be hereafter explained.

Your Committee now have pleasure in informing the subscribers that they have already made a commencement of the new buildings in the rear, which, when completed, will afford every requisite convenience for effectually carrying out the objects of the Institution.

The projected buildings behind will include a spacious lecture-room or theatre, with laboratory and apparatus-room connected, a model-room, lecturers' rooms, committee-room, ladies' and gentlemens' cloak-rooms, and a large museum gallery over all; at the same time freeing some of the present apartments for the enlargement of the library, the accommodation of classes, &c. Another important result of these additions will be the removal of the reading-room to the present large room up stairs, to which a ready access from the street will be provided.

The portion of the work already executed consists of strong stone foundations laid at the level of Collins-street. The amount of the contract was $\pounds 500$, which was voted by the Legislative Council towards the building fund of the Institution, for the year 1853.

The Committee have the further pleasure of announcing that on their representation to the Lieutenant-Governor, His Excellency kindly placed on the estimates of 1854 a further sum of £5000 towards this object, and that the vote was cheerfully agreed to by the Legislative Council.

It may be added that the Committee are now engaged in obtaining plans for the new building, and they venture to express a confident hope that the present year will not expire

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before it is fully completed and ready for the accommodation of the members. In order to enable the Committee in future to carry out the objects of the Institution in a manner commensurate with the prospects which have opened upon them, they have obtained a suitable design for improving the space in front of the present building, which, when carried out, it is estimated will produce to the Institution a yearly income of from £800 to £1000 for its permanent maintenance, and enable them to devote the whole subscriptions of the members to the augmentation of the library and to a more abundant supply of periodicals, &c., for the reading-room.

They have deferred carrying out this plan only from a want of funds, but they now confidently trust that a favourable oppportunity may present itself for immediately proceeding with the execution of these improvements.

With respect to the library department, the Committee have pleasure in saying that, although their schemes of improvement were for a long time frustrated, first, by the lengthened occupation of the rooms in possession of the Corporation, and secondly, by the tedious delay of the printer in executing the catalogue of books, they have at length, in a measure, overcome these difficulties, and initiated a system which, when fully in force, will leave nothing to be desired in this branch but the enrichment of their shelves by large additions of standard works. This deficiency it has been the assiduous object of the library Committee to supply by the purchase of a large number of the best works obtainable in the colony.

Since resuming possession of the room lately occupied by the City Treasurer, this apartment has been appropriated as a reference-room, where, by the personal exertions of the Secretary, the back files of the principal Colonial and British newspapers are being systematically arranged; and the Committee observe with pleasure, that no part of their arrangements has been productive of more real utility than this. The same room has also been devoted, at stated times, to the classes of the Institution.

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the desire of several members at the last annual meeting; but they regret to say that the subscribers generally shewed little disposition to support them. A list of the lecturers and their subjects is given in the appendix to the Report.

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The Committee feel unwillingly compelled to admit that scientific lectures are not appreciated as their value should entitle them to be, and they beg to suggest the adoption of a system, common in England, of special subscription for courses of lectures.

By this method the Committee would endeavour to foster the formation of lecture classes on particular branches of science and art, and, on a sufficient number of members offering for any course, an evening would be set aside for their use, thus testing, and at the same time meeting, the real wants of the members, whilst the Committe would reserve to themselves the duty of providing popular lectures for the general members, periodically, or from time to time as occasion might offer.

In July last the Committee made an attempt to associate the members of the Institution, through the medium of converzatione, or social meeting. The experiment proved highly successful, and a general wish has been expressed for the periodical repetition of these pleasing and useful re-unions.

Before concluding this Report, the Committee with pleasure allude to the affiliation as a class with this Institution, of the recently formed Philharmonic Society, which will materially conduce to the cultivation of classical music. This Society, though only a few months established, has displayed unusual vigour under the able guidance of Mr. Russell, and Institution.

In conclusion, your Committee congratulate the members upon the general improvement and encouraging prospects of the Institution.
