REPORT

THE COMMITTEE OF MANAGEMENT

OF THE

MELBOURNE

MECHANICS' INSTITUTION

AND SCHOOL OF ARTS,

FOR THE YEAR 1860.

FINANCIAL CONDITION.

THE Committee of Management of the MELBOURNE MECHANICS' INSTITUTION AND SCHOOL OF ARTS, in presenting their report for the year 1860, have to congratulate the members on the favorable position of the Institution at the present time.

Your committee, on entering upon their duties at the commencement of the past year, found that the sum of £500 had been advanced by the Bank of New South Wales, on the acceptance of the Trustees, as shown in the financial statement for 1859, to enable the committee to carry out the improvements so long contemplated to meet the increasing requirements of the Institution.

Your committee found it necessary to proceed with various repairs to the main building, and additions to the furniture, not previously contemplated, which has slightly increased the expenditure under that head.

The liability to the Bank, your committee are happy to state, has been reduced to £300 during the past year, and they further made arrangements to reduce it by another payment of £100 when it fell

due on the 11th January, instant. The other liabilities and current accounts falling due on the 31st December, amounting to £281 19s 1d., make a total at the close of the financial year of £581 19s 1d.

Your committee feel it to be their duty to state that it has been represented to them that the entire abolition of the entrance-fee would improve the position of the Institution, by increasing the number of members; but your committee do not expect that the revenue would be benefited materially by adopting that recommendation; inasmuch as the sum of £41 was received last year for entrance-fees from 107 new members. They would recommend, however, that the repayment of the entrance-fee should not be required from old members who have ceased to attend for some time, but who are desirous of again joining the Institution.

The Treasurer's annual statement of accounts will be found at page 9.

GENERAL MANAGEMENT.

Your committee, immediately after their appointment, directed their attention to such schemes as they had reason to believe would promote the interests of the Institution, and, although the public mind was much engaged with important movements, which in many cases have occupied the entire time of many of the young men who had been members of the Institution during 1859, yet the number of members on the roll for 1860 continues about the same as at the close of the previous year.

Your committee have no doubt that from the same cause they were unable to establish classes for the study of languages, mathematics, and chemistry, as in previous years. Classes for the study of music and phonetics were the only two carried out successfully during the past year.

A report of these classes is given at page 7.

Your committee have to acknowledge, with thanks, their obligations to those gentlemen who rendered their gratuitous services in the delivery of lectures during the winter months for the benefit of the Institution.

The subjects and names of the gentlemen will be found arranged under head of Lectures.

Chess and draughts having been provided for the special use of members, they can be had by applying in the Library; and as there is now ample accommodation, arrangements can be made for set games either in the afternoon or evening.

The number of members on the annual roll for the past year is 488, and the number of life members 129.

The number of visitors admitted (free) to the reading-room for one month, in accordance with Rule 10, during the past year, was 140.

LIBRARY AND READING ROOM.

Your committee have given to this department that attention which its importance demands, and, to make it as attractive as possible, members have been allowed to select from the shelves such books as they desired to read. By removing the restrictions which the want of space compelled your committee to adopt, the Library has been rendered more popular, and many members now spend their evenings in the room.

The additional accommodation furnished in the reading-room has been the means of increasing the regular attendance of members, and given great satisfaction, so that on the arrival of English or other important news the room is over-crowded.

The supply of newspapers and periodicals has come to hand punctually by every mail.

Such new works as were published during the past year, and considered of importance, were added to the Library.

The number of volumes added to the Library during the past year was 220.

The number of volumes in the Library is now nearly 8,000.

The number of members borrowing books from the Library during the year was 443.

LECTURES.

The general desire which seemed to prevail among the members for a course of lectures during the winter months, induced your committee to apply to the following gentlemen, who kindly consented, and the course commenced on Monday, April 23rd.

DAVID BLAIR, Esq.—Subject: “True and False Science; or, the Vestiges of Creation Exploded.”

RICHARD BIRNIE, Esq.—Subject: “Personal Recollections of London Celebrities.”

T. P. HILL, Esq.—Subject: “Classical Readings from Great Authors.”

JAMES SMITH, Esq.—Subject: Reading—“Old Curiosity Shop.”

W. S. GIBBONS, Esq.—Subject: “Some Phenomena of Light and Color” (Illustrated with Diagrams and Experiments).

JAMES ROBERTSON, Esq.—Subject: “A Reading from Shakspeare’s Tragedy of Othello.”

ARCHIBALD MICHIE, Esq.—Subject: “Philosophy of Ghosts and Witchcraft.”

The attendance on these lectures was exceedingly good, which may be an encouragement to resume the lectures on an early day in the ensuing year; and your committee would recommend that arrangements be made for giving also a series of cheap concerts during the session—a lecture and a concert alternately.

This would at least have the advantage of being a novelty in the management, and might be beneficial to the interest of the Institution.

CLASSES.

Your committee have to thank Mr. G. L. Allan and Mr. William Murray, for the zeal and attention which they paid to the respective classes under their charge.

Your committee have much pleasure in drawing attention to the very efficient manner which the members of the classes acquitted themselves at their several examinations at the close of the session.

MR. ALLAN REPORTS:

“Arrangements were made for opening a new Elementary Class, which commenced on 28th May, 1860; upwards of 120 members joined, being a more numerous attendance than at any preceding class in connection with the Institution. In November last, those who had passed satisfactorily through this course were formed into an upper class, for practising anthems, glees, madrigals, &c., which now number about 50 members, and is progressing very satisfactorily.”

MR. MURRAY REPORTS:

“A Phonographic Short-hand Class has also been established at the Institute during a portion of the past year, and the teacher having made arrangements which will enable him to extend his series, and with the increased facilities which the Institute now affords, expects to be able to form several classes for giving instruction in the different styles of the art in the course of the current year.”

GENERAL REMARKS,

Your committee, before closing their report, would respectfully remind the members of the necessity of their co-operating with the committee in circulating information respecting the Institution, and continually keeping before their friends the advantages which they would derive by connecting themselves with the Institution.

If some such effort is not made, the Institution must necessarily

suffer, for the circumstances of the times demand a reduction in the various sources from which the revenue is received.

The committee, however, look forward to the ensuing year with brighter prospects of success, believing that the united efforts of the friends of the Institution will be so directed as to enable the committee to liquidate, by the end of the year, the whole of the present liabilities.

In consequence of the recommendation of the committee, embodied in the report, for the abolition of the entrance fee chargeable on the re-admission of old members, it was resolved—

“That steps be taken to convene a public meeting of the members, in accordance with Rule 58, to consider the alteration of Rule 3, as far as regards the entrance fee.”
