# REPORT

THE COMMITTEE OF MANAGEMENT

# MECHANICS' INSTITUTION

AND SCHOOL OF ARTS,

FOR THE YEAR 1862.

Your Committee in presenting the Annual Report of the proceedings of the past year, regret that owing to the continued depressed state of business in the city, and large emigration to the New Zealand gold fields (to which place many of our members proceeded) at the commencement of last year, they were not able to realize the estimated income for 1862; much, therefore, that was proposed to be done in the course of the year, your Committee were unable to accomplish.

By the abstract of the Treasurer's account current for the year 1862, you will perceive, that the total amount of receipts for the year is £1,459 10s. 1d., while the amount for the previous year, viz., 1861, was £1,362 10s. 4d. The increase last year is in the large sum obtained for class-fees from which the Institution receives no direct benefit.

That portion of the revenue which was last year available for the working expenses of the Institution, was under that of the previous year by £29, which arises from the reduced number of subscribers.

The total liabilities of the Institution at the commencement of the year 1862, including amount due to members for library deposits, were £609; your Committee have been able to reduce that amount to £508, as shown by the balance-sheet at page 8.

The estimated income and expenditure for 1863, have been taken at a little under the income of last year, so that should your Committee

not be able to increase the revenue for 1863 over that of 1862, they will still be able to meet all the current expenses of the Institution,

and pay off a portion of the old liabilities.

At page 10, is a table showing that the year 1859 was commenced with a debt on the Institution of only £85, but before the close of that year various important alterations and additions were made which cost over £800, and in every year the debt has been gradually reduced, although no extra effort has been made for that special object.

Your Committee, on entering on their duties at the beginning of the year, examined the condition of the library and reading-room, the lecture-hall, and ascertained the necessary repairs required on the

main building.

All books and newspapers in much demand which required bindng, were at once attended to. A few reductions were made in the supply of newspapers to the reading-room, and the latest dates (by Marseilles) of others were ordered, and have been continued monthly.

The old forms in the lecture-hall have been replaced by others, which will add much to the comfort of an audience in the room, and as early as possible, further improvements in the reserved seats division of the hall will be made; the walls and ceiling also, will be

\* thoroughly renovated.

The exterior of the building has been examined and put into good repair—all the front portion of the building has been painted, both the stucco and wood-work, so that little more will be required

for some years.

The number of members on the annual roll for the year 1861, was 635, from which source the sum of £511 16s. 6d. was received; and the number in 1862, was 600, which produced £470 17s. The number of members in 1861, who continued their membership in 1862, was 391.

The number of new members who joined the Institution in 1862,

The number of life members is at present 129, and the honorary members 20.

The entrance-fee originally required from all new members has been suspended since 1861, which suspension is still recommended.

The library has had additions made to it to the extent of 259 volumes, at a cost of £91 13s.9d. There have also been added, eighty-five volumes of periodicals, the first cost of which is charged against the reading-room.

The total number of volumes added to the library will, therefore,

be 344 during the year.

The number of volumes in the library is about 8,500.

The number of members who borrowed books in 1862, was 400.

The number of volumes in circulation during the year, was 19,128 -about 2,000 less than in the previous year. The number of magazines that have been in circulation during the same period, was 5,093, which is an increase of 500 over that of 1861.

Your Committee on behalf of the Institute, beg to express their obligations to those gentlemen, for the services which they rendered by delivering the above lectures, &c.

Two concerts were given, one by the Orpheus Union and one by the music class of the Institution, conducted by Mr. G. L. Allan. The attendance was good at both, and they were well noticed by the Press.

## CLASSES.

Your Committee are glad to state, that the three classes opened in the Institution, viz., for the study of music and elocution, and for the practice of phonetic shorthand, were most successful, and had a much larger attendance than at any previous period.

Your Committee also made several attempts to establish classes for the study of the English language, French, and mathematics, but were unsuccessful in their efforts.

The young gentlemen attending the elocution class, very kindly tendered their services in giving an elocutionary entertainment for the benefit of the Institution, in return for the free use of the hall on Saturday evenings, while they were under instruction. The balance of the proceeds, after paying all expenses, was £5 12s. 6d.

Your Committee in reviewing the present position of the Institution, think there is no reason to fear for the future usefulness or stability of the Institution. The past year has been one of not only unusual depression, but the demands on the public for aid for various objects of vast importance, both in the colony and in Great Britain, have been so large, that all public institutions have suffered in a similar manner.
