REPORT

OF THE

COMMITTEE OF MANAGEMENT

OF THE

Melbourne Mechanics' Institution

AND SCHOOL OF ARTS,

FOR THE YEAR 1865.

The Committee of the Institution for the year 1865 has very great pleasure in presenting to the Members the following Report of the year's proceedings, and sincerely hopes that it will meet with the commendation and approval of the whole body of Subscribers.

It may not be considered absolutely necessary that this Report should follow the literal course and order of those of preceding years, and therefore the more natural mode on this occasion will be adopted, namely, of presenting to the Members the various matters of business which have from time to time engaged the attention of the Committee, as near as possible in the order in which they occurred and were considered by the Committee.

The first thing needing the Committee's attention was that of a thorough revision of the list of Colonial and British and Foreign Newspapers and Periodicals, when the following selections were made and have been lying upon the tables of the Reading Room during the year. (See last page of cover.) The whole of these works, with but one or two exceptions, have been regularly and constantly supplied.

Early in the year the President brought under the notice of the Committee the state of the title to the land on which the Institution is built, including the unoccupied piece at the rear of the building, situated in the right-of-way leading into Little Collins-street, and suggesting the desirability of bringing the title under the Real Property Act. The title was reported upon as unusually lengthy, and in several points defective, and requiring important evidence to make it complete. Accordingly the Committee appointed the President and Vice-President to take the step suggested, and obtain a new title under the Real Property Act. The application was made to the Committee of Titles in April, and after clearing up the defects and complying with the requisitions, the new title was issued in the following month of October. The Committee, therefore, has very great pleasure in informing the subscribers that the title to the property is now in the form of a simple sheet of parchment, similar in effect to a Grant issued by the Crown, and behind which it is impossible to go.

The Members will also see by the Balance-Sheet that the Institution merely paid costs out of pocket, amounting in all to £18 3s. 8d.

The Committee has, though the Report was not presented till late in the year, given considerable attention to the question as to how the Institution could be made of greater use and benefit to its Members, and relegate from its management present objections, so that the advantages which it now offers, and could be made to afford, would cause membership to be more largely sought for by our fellow-citizens, and become what it should be, one of the most popular Institutions of the city.

The Committee's Report, as you are aware, when presented to you at the Special General Meeting, it was then determined that the Report

should stand over till this present Annual Meeting.

The Committee may here take the opportunity of explaining that that Report was merely by way of suggestion, and prepared in order to elicit from the subscribers some practical mode of popularizing the Institution. And it is still recommended that the subject should be fairly discussed, and though billiards and some other amusements might be deemed objectionable by a majority of the Members, there are many other simple recreations which could be probably introduced with very great advantage. The Committee is fully aware that the Institution has for many years past ceased to be in the true sense of the term a "Mechanics' Institution."

This change has gradually taken place with the change in the character of the persons becoming subscribers, and hence how necessary that the objects and advantages which the Institution gives, or could be made to offer, should receive our serious consideration. There is another thought. We are termed a "School of Arts," that we are not such needs no verification. It has also been suggested that beside carrying on the Institution as at present, it might be made to answer the purposes of a Literary Club or Athenæum, consistent with the wishes of the Members. However, the whole question is left with this Meeting, and it is hoped that the Members will not allow the matter to be passed over without due consideration.

A list of new books added to the Library during the year will be found at the end of the Report.

The number of Members on the roll for 1865, exclusive of Hon. and Life Members, was 471, while for 1864 the number was 513. The number of new Members who joined the Institution in 1865 was 146. The number who ceased to be Members at the close of the year 1864 was 188. The number of Life Members at present is 125, and the Honorary 18. The number of new books added to the Library during the past year amounts to 226 volumes, and 172 volumes of new periodicals. The number of Members borrowing books from the Library of the Institution during 1865 was 411, and the number of volumes in circulation during the year was 12,912, and the number of magazines during the same period was 8,152.

The number of visitors introduced by Members in accordance with Rule 10, was 96.

The income of the Institution does not quite come up to that of last year, being a difference of about £138. This apparent deficiency is easily accounted for from the fact that during this year no Life Member has been added to our number, while last year there were two. Then there is a difference in the deposit account, it being considerably less than in 1864. Also the rents from the offices have not been so large this year as heretofore, and from the fact that some of the rooms have been unoccupied for a considerable time.


