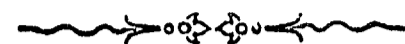

REPORT

OF THE

COMMITTEE OF MANAGEMENT

FOR THE YEAR 1872.

1. The Committee have great pleasure in presenting to the members a report for the past year, which shows that the Institution is progressing in prosperity and usefulness.

2. Early in the year a very favourable arrangement was entered into with Mr. T. B. Payne, who advanced the sum of £7,000 at 6 per cent. per annum for fourteen years on the security of the freehold property; the Committee having moreover the power of paying off the whole sum, or any part thereof (not less than £500), on giving six months' notice, should the opportunity present itself of obtaining the loan at a lower rate of interest.

3. The plans, with the additions and amendments that had been agreed upon, having been completed, tenders were called for, and that of Messrs. Turnbull and Dick, for £6,259 13s. 8d., being the lowest, was accepted. The contractors broke ground on the 23rd of April, and thenceforward proceeded steadily with the work. On the 1st of July, when the walls had risen a few feet above the ground level, a memorial stone was laid by the President of the Institution with the usual ceremonies. After this, without any stoppage except for a day or two now and then on account of weather, the buildings progressed until, about the middle of November, they were announced to be ready for occupation.

4. On the 30th of October a general meeting of the members was called to consider the desirability of changing the name of the Institution, an opinion having been very generally expressed that "Mechanics' Institute" was a misnomer; with this view of the case the meeting agreed, and unanimously decided that for the future the Institution should be called "The Melbourne Athenæum."

5. The next proceeding of interest to the Institution was the inauguration of the New Hall, etc., which His Excellency Viscount Canterbury most kindly consented to perform. On the evening of the 19th of November His Excellency, His Honor Sir Redmond Barry, etc., attended, when, after an address consisting of a concise history of the Institution had been read by the President, His Excellency declared the Hall open under the new and more comprehensive title of The Melbourne Athenæum. An excellent concert, in which the Philharmonic and Liedertafel Societies took part, wound up the proceedings. The number of members present was not nearly so large as should have been the case, considering the importance of the occasion.

6. Respecting the new buildings it may be remarked that, however handsome a hall had been erected at the rear it would have been in a measure lost if the old entrance had been retained. The thorough reformation that has been made in this respect must be approved by all, as what was perhaps the very worst approach to any public institution in Melbourne has been transformed into one of the best, and there are few entrances—if any—that can at all compare with the handsome and commodious corridor by which access is now obtained to the several parts of the Institution.

7. The Reading-room has been increased in height and size, and refitted with new furniture and the latest improvements. Its literary furnishing has been studiously cared for, and the aggregation of newspapers and periodicals (the largest to be found in any one building on this side of the world) can now be perused with ease and comfort.

8. A new feature is the Reading-room for ladies, containing an excellent selection of magazines and newspapers more particularly suited to their tastes. The Committee believe that this convenience requires only to be generally known to ladies visiting town to be welcomed by them as a most grateful retreat from the heat and dust of the streets. Toilet requisites are also provided.

9. It having been formerly a matter of frequent complaint that there was no place in which a member could converse with a visitor or another member, the Committee have set apart one of the new rooms for conversation, smoking, and such games as chess, dominoes, &c.

10. There are also rooms in the basement suitable for minor meetings, retiring rooms, etc. Water and gas are laid on wherever necessary. The whole of the available area has been utilised to the utmost extent, and the Committee are able to assure the members that the manner in which the works have been carried out is most creditable to all concerned.

11. It will be necessary during the present year to make some alterations in the fittings of the smaller Hall, and to redecorate it. The front of the building will also be renovated.

12. Immediately after the opening of the Hall it was engaged for a twelvemonth for Sunday services by the Scots' Church Congregation, who require its use during the erection of their new Church. The revenue from this source is £260 per annum.

13. The Committee having made arrangements for the delivery of a series of lectures, the first was kindly given by His Honor Sir Redmond Barry, on the 16th of December. On this occasion also the members did not support the Institution in the manner which was expected, there being out of a roll of six hundred only twenty-five present, a fourth of whom were members of committee.

14. Though of course discouraged to a certain extent by this want of support from the members, the Committee were not deterred from proceeding with a project calculated to prove of so much advantage to the members if they would avail themselves of their opportunities, and a second lecture by Mr. Ellery would have been given ere this had not an affection of his throat caused him to request a postponement. Three or four more lectures will follow at short intervals, and it is to be hoped that on future occasions the members will show their appreciation of the efforts of the Committee and the kindness of the lecturers, by attending in considerable numbers, whereby they will benefit the Institution, and, consequently, themselves.

15. The recent musical festivals, more particularly that at the Exhibition, have not left room for any smaller speculations of that nature, but it is expected that it will not be long before the Hall will be in frequent requisition for this class of entertainment. Its acoustic properties for music have been pronounced perfect, and those who have attended the balls which have been held in it pronounce it to be by far the coolest room, with the best floor, in all Melbourne.

16. In order that the capabilities and advantages of the Hall may be brought before the community in the most effective manner, the Committee have entered into an agreement with Mr. R. S. Smythe to act as business-agent in the letting of the Hall, and they trust that the arrangements which have been entered into (based upon "payment by results") will be found satisfactory to both parties.

17. From the circular which has been recently issued by the Committee you will be aware that it is proposed to establish classes for the use of the members and their families. The responses that were

received as to French and Phonography were considered sufficient to commence with those classes, and steps are being taken to get them quickly under way. If these are found to be a success, others will doubtless follow.

18. Though the Reading-room and (for the greater part of the time) the Library were kept open during the progress of the alterations, the Institution may be said to have been partially closed for some three or four months during the year; it is therefore the more satisfactory to be able to announce that instead of the roll of members having suffered a decrease the number for the last year was greater than at any previous period of its history; and every day there are instances of persons becoming members who would certainly never have been aware of the existence of the Athenæum if it had not been for the increased accommodation. Although the subscription was previously an undoubtedly economical expenditure, a member can now, with greatly increased satisfaction to himself, invite his friends to inspect the Institution and to become members. During the current month (January) a larger number of members has joined the Institution than was ever the case in any one month previously.

In addition to the seven vacancies caused by the retirement of half the Committee in accordance with the rules (but who are eligible for re-election), there are two extra vacancies, one caused by the resignation of Dr. Avent, the other by Mr. Batten vacating office, he having been elected by the Committee in accordance with the rules until this evening, in the place of Dr. Smith.

25. In two clauses of this report the Committee have felt it their duty to refer to the scanty attendance of members on occasions of interest to the Institution. It is to be hoped that all that is required by many is to remind them that full attendances on such occasions as may arise in the course of the current year, will encourage the officers and Committee to increase their efforts to provide subjects for their entertainment.

26. The desirability of holding periodical conversaciones and soirees in the new hall, has been spoken of amongst some of the members who interest themselves in the progress of the Institution ; but, if the experiment is tried, it will be necessary to its success for the general body to evince a greater *esprit de corps*, and to take more interest than they have hitherto done in seconding and supporting the efforts of those they elect to conduct the business of the Institution.

27. It is a matter for regret that there are many members who care for nothing but their newspaper and their book, and do not regard themselves as being in any other way interested in the Institution. To them it is suggested that the more it succeeds the more books and newspapers will they have ; but to those members who take an interest in the *progress* of the Institution, the Committee desire to address a few words. There are doubtless many engaged in business in this city who would be glad to avail themselves of the advantages to be obtained at the Athenæum if they were once made aware of them, and it is suggested to members desiring its success how much they might help towards it, by setting before their friends a statement of those advantages, and by inviting them to visit it and inspect for themselves the extent of the accommodation that is offered for so small a subscription. If they would resolve to carry out this suggestion *con amore*, it would not take long to double the number of members, and to make the Melbourne Athenæum second to no institution of the kind in the southern hemisphere.
