discretion in Government Debentures or mortgage of real estate in Victoria - It appears that they have invested in bank deposit which is probably a safe & advantageous mode of investment but they must understand that this investment is made at their own risk as to the solvency of the Bank & that if the Bank failed they would have to make good any loss

With reference to Trustees generally it is a fundamental principle of Equity that where trust money cannot be applied either immediately or by a short day to the purpose of the trust it is the duty of the Trustee to make the fund productive by the investment of it upon some proper security -

I am therefore of opinion that the Committee of the Melbourne Athenaeum would be held to be liable to make good any loss which may arise by depositing money belonging to the Institution on a fixed deposit with their Bank much more (as has been done) if they invest the same by way of deposit with a Building Society & at the same time they would appear to be liable for allowing any considerable sum of money to be idle & unproductive - The Committee could relieve themselves from liability by handing over any sum in their hands not wanted for the immediate purposes of the Institution to the Trustees for investment in Govt Debentures or first Mortgages of real estate but so many difficulties to this course being adopted at once suggest themselves that I think that this course is unpracticable

# Annual General Meeting of the Members held in the Upper Hall Wednesday 29<sup>th</sup> Jan 1890

The chair was taken by the Vice President Mr Henry R. Fuge in the absence of the President Mr Joseph Goode from whom an apology for absence was received.

and about twenty members of the Institution. The Secretary read the advertisement concerning the meeting. The said advertisement had appeared twice in the daily journals, and had been posted in the Reading Room in conformity with Rule 20.

The minutes of the previous meeting were read and confirmed

The Secretary read the Committee's Report  
Copies of the Balance sheet were circulated among the members, and it was resolved that it be taken as read

The Committee congratulate the members of the Melbourne Athenaeum on the great success of the Institution during the past year.

By referring to the Balance Sheet, it will be seen that the gross receipts for the year amount to £4558 6s. 3d., and the expenditure to £3571 0s. 3d., giving a surplus of £987 6s., increasing our cash balance to £3865 7s. 6d., of which £3275 is deposited at interest.

The following are the details of the receipts:—Subscriptions, £1530 16s.; rent of front shops, £1155; rent of large hall, £1239 19s. 8d.; small hall, £232 14s.; rooms, £256 14s. 10d.; interest, £120; sales, £23 14s. 0d.

The principal items of expenditure are:—Interest on mortgage, £990; salaries and wages, £994 10s.; books, magazines and newspapers, £625 5s. 1d.; repairs and furniture, £276 5s. 2d.; gas and electric light, £267 12s. 10d.; rates, £127 10s.; binding, £97 14s. 5d.

The electric light has been introduced into the reading room, library, vestibule, and corridors, and has been found a great improvement, especially in the reading room, where the temperature in the evening has been reduced by eighteen degrees.

There are now 1515 members on the roll, of whom 312 joined during the year.

The number of books added to the Library was 698; the total number of works issued to subscribers was 30,601, and 7209 magazines.

A special general meeting of the members of the Melbourne Athenaeum was held last night in the Athenaeum-buildings. The attendance was small. The president (Mr. H. R. Page) occupied the chair. The President said they had been called together to consider the propriety or otherwise of passing a new rule for the management and carrying on the affairs of the institution. The proposed rule was as follows:—'When ever there shall be any money owing upon mortgage of the real property of the institution, the general committee shall (whenever they shall be in a position to do so) provide a 'sinking fund,' to be applied in or towards the liquidation of any such mortgage, and the moneys for the time being standing to the credit of such fund shall from time to time be invested by the said committee, by way of fixed deposit, in some one or more of the incorporated banks carrying on business in Melbourne, or on first mortgage of real estate. And the moneys which have now accumulated shall form the nucleus of such sinking fund, to be applied in or towards the liquidation of any such mortgage of the real property of the institution.' All the necessary formalities had been complied with, and the meeting had been duly convened as provided for by Rule 21. As they were all doubtless aware, the institution was at the present time subject to a mortgage to the trustees of the will of the late J. L. Sumner, for £18,000, bearing interest at 5 per cent. per annum, and payable on the 30th June, 1892. The annual reports of committee during the past three years had informed them amongst other things, that they had been saving money, and the last of such reports stated that they had saved in all as much as £3,275, which was at the present time deposited at interest in the name of the committee. During the latter part of last year it had occurred to some of the committee that the rules of the institution did not warrant the committee in retaining in their hands and investing so large a sum of money, and investigation showed that the proper course would be to hand this money and any further sums saved to the trustees of the institution, who, however, could only invest the same upon Government debentures or first mortgages of real estate. The committee, however, thought that the most suitable way in which to invest the money would be by way of fixed deposit in some one or more of the incorporated banks carrying on business in this city, and if the proposed rule were passed this would be made legal. It might perhaps be asked why the new rule was not so drawn as that the proposed investments should be in the names of the trustees of the institution—Messrs. F. M. Gibbs, T. Moubrey, and the Hon. N. Thornley. He (the President) was sure they would give the committee credit for not wanting in any manner to ignore or put a slight upon those gentlemen; but, on the whole, it was considered that the members would have no objection to leave this fund under the control of the committee in the way proposed, especially as the trustees themselves approved of this course being adopted. In fact, they had all signed the new rule. In conclusion, he trusted that the institution would be as prosperous during the present and following years as it had been during the past three years, and there would in that case be little doubt but that, on the 30th June, 1892, when the present mortgage fell due, the committee would be able to reduce the same by at least £5,000, and renew the balance for a further term of years at as low, if not a lower, rate of interest. He had now much pleasure in moving the adoption of the new rule. Mr. H. H. HAYTER, vice-president, seconded the motion, which was carried unanimously. A vote of thanks to the chair terminated the proceedings.

# Specification of repairs, painting, paperhausing &c to be done at the Melbourne Athenaeum

Small Hall - Plastering and mouldings to be made good. Ceiling to be lined with strong paper and then whitewashed.
