REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE
OF THE
MELBOURNE ATHENÆUM,
FOR THE YEAR 1912.

*To be submitted to the Members at the General Meeting,
Wednesday, 29th January, 1913, at 8 p.m.*

THE Committee of the Melbourne Athenæum submit their report of the transactions of the year 1912.

The gross receipts for the year amount to £2866 10s. 7d., and the expenditure to £2410 16s. 10d.

The credit balance in the bank is £459 6s. 4d.

The mortgage for £16,000, secured by the property of the institution, due to the trustees of the estate of the late T. J. Sumner, expired on June 30, 1912. In view of the fact that it would be necessary to obtain the money elsewhere, as it was understood that the trustees would require the repayment of the principal on that date, your Committee had accumulated the sum of £2000 for the purpose of reduction. The stringency in the money market rendered it impossible to obtain a fresh mortgage at the same rate of interest, viz., 4 per cent. After some negotiation, arrangements were made with the trustees of the Sumner Estate for the repayment of £2000, and the extension of the mortgage for £14,000 for a further term of two years at the same rate of interest. This arrangement must be regarded as eminently satisfactory. Your Committee trusts that in June 1914, when fresh arrangements will have to be made, the conditions prevailing in the money market will be easier. Your Committee is indebted to the Honorary Treasurer for the satisfactory arrangements which have been made.

The number of members on the roll is 454, of whom 12 are life members, and 72 joined during the year.

The Committee regret to report that there is a slight falling off in the number of members on the roll, but during the last three months, there has been a slight increase.

The Committee regretfully report that, in November, the institution lost by death the valuable services of its Librarian, Mr. William Smith, who had been in its employ for forty-seven years. Mr. Smith had been in failing health for some time, and in order to relieve him to some extent of the burden of his duties, the Committee, in August, appointed Mr. W. H. Remfry as assistant Librarian. Mr. Smith, however, died on November 5. In order to mark their appreciation of Mr. Smith's long and faithful service, the Committee decided to pay to his widow his salary for twelve months, and the following minute was recorded in the books of the institution:—

"The General Committee of the Melbourne Athenæum deplores the loss the Institution has sustained in the death of an old and valued officer, in its Librarian, Mr. William Smith, who had been in its service for forty-seven years. It conveys its sympathy to Mrs. Smith and the members of his family."

The Committee have appointed Mr. W. H. Remfry as Acting Librarian for six months.

The appointment of Mr. W. A. Callaway as a Trustee of the Institution made by the Annual Meeting on January 31, 1912, has been completed, and the necessary legal documents have been duly registered at the Office of Titles.

The Election of Honorary Office-Bearers resulted in the return of the following gentlemen:—President, Mr. David Martin; Vice-President, Mr. J. H. Kelly; Treasurer, Mr. Charles Rennie; Committee, Messrs. Masters, Scanlen, Knight, and Baker.

The President, Vice-President, Treasurer, and the following Members of Committee retire from office, but are eligible for re-election, viz.:—Messrs. Apps, Downward, Cooke, Kent, Chambers, and Thodey.

Your Committee has had under consideration the renovation of the main hall and the main entrance, and the decoration of the front of the building. A comprehensive scheme has been evolved, including an improvement in the ventilation, at an estimated cost of £350, and it is hoped that at the Annual Meeting it will be possible to announce that tenders have been let for the work.

The Art Gallery has again been largely patronised—successful exhibitions of paintings and other works of art having been held by Messrs. W. B. McInnes, C. Crozier, Robert A. Forbes, Laurie Taylor, C. Wheeler, Walter Withers, Ambrose Patterson, A. Esam, Hans Heysen, J. Wolinski, J. Sommers, Fred McCubbin, Louis McCubbin, John Mather, Blamire Young, E. C. Officer, Henri Tebbitt, Miss Vaile, Miss C. L. Jenkins, Miss Asquith Baker, and Mrs. R. Jenkins. The gallery has now established a world-wide reputation, and every available date for the season of 1913 has been booked. In order to bring the gallery right up-to-date, the Committee has let tenders for the extension of the lantern light in order to improve the lighting of the east and west walls, and the removal of the platform, which will make the hanging line uniform all round the gallery, at a total cost of £183 5s. These alterations are in course of completion, and will be ready for the opening of the season in February.
