

# REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE

#### OF THE

# MELBOURNE ATHENÆUM,

# FOR THE YEAR 1917.

To be submitted to the Members at the General Meeting, Wednesday, 30th January, 1918, at 8 p.m.

THE Committee of the Melbourne Athenæum submit their report of the transactions of the year 1917, which is the seventy-eighth since the founding of the Institution.

# THE COMMITTEE.

The Committee records, with regret, the death of Sir Edward Carlile, K.C., K.C.B., a very old member of the Institution, who filled the Presidential Chair in 1916, and had been an active member of the Committee for many years.

There have been 12 meetings of the General Committee.

The President, Vice-President, Treasurer, and the following members of Committee, who are eligible for re-election, retire from office, viz., Messrs. Martin, Masters, Topp, Wigg and Dr. Rinder.

## FINANCIAL.

The gross receipts for the year amount to £2832 1s. 9d. and the gross expenditure to £2726 1s. 8d., the result being a profit of £106 0s. 1d. on the year's working. The increase of £353 17s. 5d. in the receipts was most gratifying under the abnormal conditions prevailing. The most satisfactory item in the receipts was the continued increase in subscriptions, the amount (£600 0s. 6d.) being the largest received from this source since 1900.

### **RE-ORGANISATION OF LIBRARY.**

The Committee, during the year, appointed a Sub-Committee to enquire into the best means of re-organising and improving the Library and Reading Room, and making this branch of the Institution more attractive. The Sub-Committee, consisting of the President, Dr. A. W. Rinder,

Messrs. E. H. Cooke, F. A. Kernot, J. O. Thomson and G. H. Wigg went very thoroughly into the matter, and a comprehensive scheme was adopted. The work has been completed, and has met with general commendation. The Library and Smoking Room have been re-decorated, and made more comfortable. and the Reading Room has been re-arranged. In the Library a great amount of literature of a past date has been disposed of, and the general re-arrangement of the shelving has resulted in providing a means of displaying the books which did not exist before, and of enabling members to realise the very many advantages the Library provides. Arrangements have also been made whereby the supply of books and magazines will be increased and expedited. The Committee looks forward with confidence to a large increase in the number of subscribers as a result of the work done, and urges members to bring the many facilities the Institution affords under the notice of their friends.

## THE LIBRARY.

The Librarian, Staff-Sergeant W. H. Remfry, after two and a half years' service in the Australian Imperial Forces, returned to duty in October. Mr. J. B. Cooper, who had acted as Librarian during Sergeant Remfry's absence, had already commenced the work of re-organisation, and, in order that it might be completed, his services were retained until the end of the year. Mr. Cooper's work was so highly appreciated that on his retirement a presentation was made by the members, in the form of a wallet of notes, to mark their recognition of the manner in which he had carried out his duties.

A new departure has been the appointment of a lady assistant in the Library. There were over one hundred applicants for the position, and the Committee unanimously selected Miss Alice Cooper, a daughter of the late acting-Librarian.

### LARGE HALL (Seats 800).

#### 1. FOR NIGHT USE.

Charge for One Night, £5 5s., except on a PUBLIC HOLIDAY or a SATURDAY, when it shall be £7 7s.

Charge for Electric Lights in front of Building (if required), Five Shillings per night.

Charge for Fireman, Seven Shillings and Sixpence per Performance.

#### 2. FOR DAY USE.

Charge for Meetings, Two Guineas per Day.

Charge for Matinees, Three Guineas per Day.

Charge for Fireman, Seven Shillings and Sixpence per Matinee.

3. FOR DAY AND NIGHT USE.

Charge for Bazaars and Shows and other purposes requiring both Day and Night use, Seven Guineas per Day (SATURDAYS, Nine Guineas).

Charge for Fireman, One Shilling and Threepence per Hour. (Minimum, Fifteen Shillings per Day.)

#### 4. FOR A SEASON.

Charge for a Season of Six Nights per Week, Twenty-five Pounds per Week. Matinees, One Guinea each extra.

Charge for Fireman, Seven Shillings and Sixpence per Performance.

5. FOR ELECTIONS.

Charge for Election terminating at 6 p.m., with use of Room for Counting of Votes, Five Gumeas.

Charge for Election in which Hall is required in the Evening as well, Seven Guineas.

#### LECTURE HALL (Seats 350).

One Engagement,  $\pounds 2$  2s.; Two do.  $\pounds 4$ .

For DAY MEETINGS.—£1 10s.
