## REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE

of the

## MELBOURNE ATHENEUM,

## FOR THE YEAR 1930.

To be submitted to the Members at the General Meeting
Wednesday, January 20, 1931, at 8 p.m.

THE Committee of the Melbourne Athenæum submits its report of the transactions of the year 1930, which is the ninety-first since the fomdation of the Institution.

The Finance Committee, Messrs. Wigg (chairman), Bates, Callaway, Cameron, Emery, Masters, Thomson and the President; the Library Committee, Messrs. Topp (chairman), Biggs, Burr, Callaway, Lillie, Lush, Wigg; Dr. Kennison, Major Bolton and the President; the House Committee, Messrs. Wigg, Dillon, Lillie, Masters, Thomson, Dr. Kennison, Major Bolton and the President, held the usual meetings, and thus attended regularly to the various departments of the Institution.

The President, Vice-President, Treasurer and the following members of the Committee, who are eligible for re-election, retire from office, viz., Messrs. Topp, Dillon, Burr, Lillie, Pietzcker and Bates. There are also three racancies caused by the deaths of Lt.-Col. Williams and Mr. J. O. Thomson, and the appointment as Treasurer of Mr. G. H. Wigg, who was re-elected to the Committee last year

OBITUARY-Your Committee records with deep regret the death, on May 11, of Mr. Charles Rennie, one of the Trustees and the Treasurer of the Institution. He was a member of the Institution for fifty-one years, and for forty-one years was Treasurer. He was also a Trustee and was twice President. When, in 1924, the main hall was transformed into a theatre, the foundation stone was moved and reset in the south wall by Mr . Rennie as President. His loss to the Institution can only be realised by those who knew all that he did for it.

Your Committee also records with regret the death on December 29 of Mr. J. O. Thomson, who had been in ill-health for some time. Mr. Thomson had been a member of the Committee for fourteen years, and was President in 1922 and 1923, the period during which the negotiations for the transforming of the main hall into the theatre were elaborated and completed. As a mem-
ber of the Finance Committee, Mr . Thomson rendered valuable service to the Institution

Your Committee regrets also to record the death of Lieut.-Col. Richard Williams, who died on January 29. He had been a member of the Institution for many years, and was, for two years, a member of the Committee, on which his services were highly appreciated.

## TREASURER AND TRUSTEE.

Mr. G. H. Wigg was appointed Treasurer in succession to Mr . Rennie on June 6, and was also appointed a Trustee on July 4.

## FINANCIAL.

The statement of accounts submitted herewith must be very satisfactory to members. It will be seen that the gross ordinary receipts for the year amounted to $£ 7620 / 6 / 4$, an increase of $£ 103 / 1 / 8$ over the previous year. The gross ordinary expenditure was $£ 1554 / 8 / 7$, an increase of $£ 303 / 14 / 1$.
The most gratifying feature of the statement is the continued increase in members' subscriptions ( $£ 56 / 17 / 6$ ). On the expenditure side, your Committee has been able to allocate $£ 1889 / 14 / 2$ for books, magazines and news-papers-an increase of $x 42 / 4 / 10$ over the figures for 1929.

## LAND TAX.

Your Committee has pleasure in reporting that during the year the Federal Land Tax Commissioner reversed his decision of 1929 that "the Institution is liable for Federal Land Tax," and refunded all the monies paid, viz., $£ 1153 / 17 / 3$, thus confirming the view held by your Committee that the Institution was exempt.

## SPECTAL MEETINGS.

In order to provide the funds for the installation of the lift, it was necessary to increase the mortgage by $£ 2500$. The necessary authority to borrow not more than $£ 3500$ was granted to the Committee by the special meetings of members, held on February 24 and March 6.

## MORTGAGE.

The Committee thereupon arranged with the Australian Mutual Provident Society for a further advance of $£ 2500$, at the rate of seven per cent. per annum. The mortgage was executed and the money received. Your Committee, however, was able to repay $£ 500$ of this amount and still finish the year with a credit balance of $£ 941 / 18 / 6$.

## JIFT.

During the year an electric lift was installed providing access to the Reading Room and Art Gallery, the entrance on the ground floor being from the stalls entrance to the theatre. It has proved not only a boon to members, but a distinct adjunct to the Art Gallery, which has benefited considerably through the increased attendances. The architects-Messrs. Sydney Smith, Ogg and Serpell-prepared the plans, and the work was carried out under their supervision to the satisfaction of all concerned and with a minimum of inconvenience to members and the lessees. A tender was let to C. F. Pittard for the construction of the lift shaft, and to Edmiston and O'Neill for the electric lift and the neces-
sary machinery. The total cost of the lift and alterations was $£ 3002 / 14 /$-.

## LECTURES.

During the year your Committee, acting on the suggestion of Mr. L. V. Biggs, inaugurated a series of winter lectures. Mr. Biggs and Mr. W. A. Callaway were appointed a sub-committee to draw up a scheme and a programme. Lectures were given as follow:-
Professor G. H. Cowling, M.A. (Leeds); Subject, "Getting the Best Out of Books." Mr. T. F. Cooke (Librarian Public Lending Library) ; Subject, "The Trend of the Modern Novel." Professor Ernest Scott; Subject, "The Spanish Explorers of the Pacific." Rev. C. Irving Benson; Subject, "Poetry and Modern Life."

The success of the series was most marked, each lecture being very largely attended, the average attendance being more than 250 . Your Committee proposes to hold a similar series during the coming winter.

## THEATRE EXITS.

During the year your Committee entered into an agreement with the Victoria Palace Ltd., whereby the theatre exits on the eastern side were altered. The object was to facilitate certain work being carried out by the Victoria Palace Itd., which bore the whole of the cost. The result has been that these exits have been materially improved, and are now completely in accordance with the requirements of the Board of Public Health and of the City Council.

## THE LIBRARY.

The Library and Reading Room still continue to be most attractive, and the steady increase in membership is not only gratifying, but a distinct proof of their popularity. The number of country subscribers is steadily increasing, with the result that the Library is becoming most widely known. The attendances at the Reading Room, and the number of books and magazines which
are exchanged, are a standing evidence of the manner in which the Library is appreciated by members.

## ART GALLERY.

The popularity of the Art Gallery has been maintained, exhibitions being held continuously from February 17 to December 24 . Your Committee, in view of the extra facilities provided by the lift, increased the rental for the Gallery, and wishes to convey its appreciation of the cordial spirit in which the artists accepted the increased charge, not one artist cancelling his engagement in conscquence. During the year a new departure was entered into with marked success. By an arrangement with Mr . L. Gill, three composite exhibitions were held, in which leading artists co-operated,
and the result was that a very high standard was reached. At the first of these exhibitions pictures were hung by Sir John Longstaff, Miss Dora L. Wilson, Miss Cumbrae Stewart, Messrs. Tom Roberts, Blamire Young, John Shirlow, Harold Herbert, Ernest Buckmaster, and statuary was exhibited by Mr. Paul Montford. At the second, the exhibitors were Miss Cumbrae Stewart, Messrs. Rupert Bunny, Charles Wheeler, Louis McCubbin, Harry B. Harrison, Clifford J. Orme, Alexander St. Paull and John Shirlow; and at the third, Miss Dora L. Wilson, Miss A. M. E. Bale, Messrs. Blamire Young, Harold Herbert, G. C. Benson, John Rowell, William Rowell and Rupert Bunny contributed pictures.

In addition, exhibitions were held by Misses May Roxburgh, A. Dent, C. Beckett, Messrs. J. E. Flett, A. D. Colquhoun, Colin Colahan, Charles Bryant, W. M. Whitney, A. E. Newbury, J. Jorgensen, Bernard Hall, E. Buckmaster, Granville Dunstan, J. Hennessy, Twenty Melbourne Painters, the Melbourne Society of Women Painters, and the Australian Art Association.
Your Committee is pleased to report that, despite the depression, there are very few vacant dates for 1931.
The Australian Chess Congress was held in the Art Gallery, beginning on December 26, and was largely attended.

## THE STAFF.

Your Committee desires to express its appreciation of the zeal and care shown during the year by the Secretary, the Librarian and the other members of the staff. We are especially indebted to Mr . R. W. E. Wilmot for his close and successful attention to the business interests of our Institution, and to Mr. M. De Pledge for his discriminating ability in the purchase of our books.
