From the Archives

Archivist Fiona Moore continues to unearth some gems from our archives, including a

souvenir program from a film screening of William Shakespeare's *Hamlet* at the Melbourne Athenaeum Theatre.

Hamlet premiered at the Athenaeum in June 1948 and, in a major coup for theatre lessee Frank Talbot, the film's star, Sir Laurence Olivier, travelled to Melbourne for the opening.

It was reported in the *Argus* newspaper the following day that Sir Laurence was met by an enthusiastic crowd that flowed out onto the street. The film's season was a major success for the Athenaeum with tickets selling out.



The program was donated by film historian Ina Bertrand and has a special place in the Athenaeum's archives.







The Ath on ABC Radio

The Athenaeum was the focus of ABC Radio's drive program in early April when it was the subject of the program's Unofficial History segment.

Various listeners called the program with stories about the Athenaeum and presenter Warwick Long interviewed theatre usher Jake Waterworth about Roberta, the building's resident ghost.








Fringe Myrtles
