
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Book Recommendations

Library manager Fiona Malcolm reads a lot of crime novels (244 last year) so she is the ideal candidate to recommend a book or two. Here are two of her top picks.

Her favourite international crime novel last year was *The Cracked Mirror* by Chris Brookmyre. The publisher's blurb describes the novel as a cross-genre hybrid of Agatha Christie and Michael Connelly and reads: "You know Penny Coyne. The little old lady who has solved multiple murders in her otherwise sleepy village, despite bumbling local police. A razor-sharp mind in a twinset and tweed.

"You know Johnny Hawke. Hard-bitten LAPD homicide detective. Always in trouble with his captain, always losing partners, but always battling for the truth, whatever it takes. Against all the odds, against the usual story, their worlds are about to collide. It starts with a dead writer and a mysterious wedding invitation. It will end with a rabbit hole that goes so deep, Johnny and Penny might come to question not just whodunnit, but whether they want to know the answer."




If you'd like to read an Australian crime author, Fiona's pick is *The Ledge* by Christian White.

According to the publisher: "When human remains are discovered in the forests of regional Victoria, the police are baffled, the locals are shocked, and one group of old friends starts to panic. Their long-held secret is about to be uncovered. It all began in 1999 when sixteen-year-old Aaron ran away from home, dragging his friends into an unforeseeable chain of events that no one escaped from unscathed."

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
Crime Fiction Awards

The shortlist for Best Crime Fiction is *Shadow City* by Natalie Conyer, *Sanctuary* by Garry Disher, *Unbury the Dead* by Fiona Hardy, *The Creeper* by Margaret Hickey, *Cold Truth* by Ashley Kalagian Blunt, *Highway 13* by Fiona McFarlane, *17 Years Later* by JP Pomare and *Storm Child* by Michael Robotham.

In the Best International Crime Fiction category, the shortlist is *Return to Blood* by Michael Bennett, *Leave the Girls Behind* by Jacqueline Bublitz, *The Waiting* by Michael Connelly, *A Case of Matricide* by Graeme Macrae Burnet, *Moscow X* by David McCloskey and *Home Truths* by Charity Norman.
